However, none of this information was available to L7 when he felt that his section was in danger and he had to make his decision to engage or not engage. After reviewing all majorial associated with this investigation, I find that LT had sufficient evidence, at the time ne gaged, to identify Mr as a hostile actor with hostile intent. In addition, I can find no contributing factors that, if changed, cogaged, to identify Mr could have altered the outcome of this event.




